We've made it easy for you to make your **OWN manger scene** that you can color yourself! **Just follow the simple steps below**—and make sure to see the VIDEO your Adventure Guides made to show you how it works:



1. **Print off** colorable manger scene cutouts that you **download** at www.holyheroes.com/nativity.



2. **Color them, cut them out,** and **tape or glue** them onto some of **your own cardboard** so they are more sturdy (*paper plates work great in place of cardboard*).

3. **Cut out** a bunch of your own **cardboard "stands"** and **insert** them **on the bottoms** so the cutouts can **stand up**.

4. Put your "sacrifice manger" in **front of the stable background**—*that's where Baby Jesus will go when He's born*—and **put the animals around** the stable. Don't forget to **color the little animals** that you will find hidden in the stable already!



REMEMBER: Some of the manger scene items are not to be used right now—save them for later when it gets closer to Christmas morning!

You can color them and get them ready now...but just wait a few more days before you use them. Okay?
